

## **Discussion Session and Book Launch on Thirty Years in Prison**

The Institute of Social and Cultural Studies (ISCS) hosted a Discussion Session and Book Launch on 31 January 2026 in Lecture Room-II, Annexe of the India International Centre, New Delhi. This event celebrated the publication of the book 'Thirty Years in Prison,' written by the revolutionary figure Trailokya Nath Chakraborty, and gathered esteemed scholars, intellectuals and students for a thoughtful discussion regarding the text and its historical relevance.

The session was presided over by Prof. Himanshu Kumar Chaturvedi, Director of the Indian Institute of Advanced Study (IIAS), who emphasized the significance of autobiographical prison narratives as essential historical sources for comprehending revolutionary movements and colonial resistance in his remarks.

The panel included distinguished speakers such as Dr. Rakesh Sinha, a prominent author and former Member of Parliament (*Rajya Sabha*), and Shri Hindol Sengupta, Professor of International Relations at O. P. Jindal Global University. Both speakers analyzed the intellectual, political, and civilizational aspects reflected in the work, placing the author's experiences within the larger context of India's freedom struggle and the ideological currents of the early twentieth century.

Specifically, Dr. Rakesh Sinha remarked during his address that the contemporary endeavor of accurately documenting the history of India's freedom struggle should not be termed Rewriting of History but rather Rebirth of History. In this context, 'Thirty Years in Prison,' authored by the revolutionary Trailokya Nath Chakraborty, serves as a crucial primary component.

The discussion attracted an engaged audience comprising scholars, students, researchers, and invited guests. The interactive dialogue that ensued after the formal presentations allowed participants to reflect on historiography, memory, and the influence of revolutionary literature in shaping national consciousness.
